B: IN PROGRESS:

- (1) "*Security Aspects of Election Management in Nigeria*": Work involves basically: (1) bringing together the research studies on various aspects of the problem of investigation that have been previously carried out by me from the '80's to the present, and including some of the additional issues of analysis missing from those previous studies; and (2) having all the research studies integrated into a coherent whole, and subsequently published as text-book. It is my next book project.
- (2) "*Nigeria's Retired Military Generals in Traditional Ruling Positions*": Aims at carrying the thesis propounded in the author's (1999) book on **The Retired Military as Emergent Power Factor in Nigeria** into another area of elite penetration that was only broached but not explored, although long known to have also attracted increasing interests and participation of the class of retired generals: namely, that of retiring into traditional ruling positions as chiefs, *obas*, *obis*, or *emirs* among others. What are the names of top retired generals who have taken on such chiefly positions whether actual or ceremonial after

leaving the service, in which parts of the country, following what processes, and since when? What is the appropriate theory to propound for analyzing this other phenomenon? And what are the implications of this concept about 'retired military as traditionalisers' for the received body of knowledge about military role in modern settings? Ultimately, when completed, the research output is intended to be published either possibly as a monograph, a journal-sized article, or a small research note.

Relying on data combed from the submissions presented to the various revenue allocation commissions sitting over those years, and the commissions being themselves sequel to the various constitution reviews earlier agreed as framework for central-regional/state interaction, the findings from the study underlined the following: (a) The recurrent and cyclic nature of the threats of "secessionism" experienced by

the Nigerian federation vis-à-vis its component regions/states over the period of study (the fact, for example, that all the three major regions of the federation, namely the North, West, and East, had at one period or the other invoked this threat); (b) The shifting nature of the fiscal fortunes facing the regions/states over that period (i.e. the fact that the regions/states were not all and at the same time equally resource-endowed, neither were they all equally able to stand on their own, and without having to be subsidized by others from the country's federally distributable pool. The shifting stance of these regions/states on which revenue allocation formulas to canvass for the federal government's adoption from among the various competing allocation principles such as "derivation", "even development", "population", and "national interest" or "national unity" also reflected this); (c) The shifting nature of the political choices made by regional/state leaders regarding the constitutional issues of "unitarism", "federalism", or "loose federalism" over those years (and also accounting in part for the variation in the coalition-building practices and strategies pursued between and among the major regional/state leaderships during the period); and, finally, about (d) The "oil's shadow of secession" being already visible on Nigeria's political landscape long before the fall of 1965. That 1968 scholarly intervention in the debate about *the Biafran question* and its root cause was to form the point of departure for the analysis in the author's first published journal article, i.e. that on "Biafra: reflections on the nation-state in Africa", the latter being itself a rejoinder to an article done by someone on the same topic (see Publication 35 above), and also to influence aspects of the author's contribution made in much later years to a 1997 collection on "Separatism: culture counts, resources decide" (see Publication 26 above).
